





Night by Elie Wiesel


Monstrous Regiment by Terry Pratchett


Noor-un-Nissa Inayat Khan by Sufiya Ahmed


The Hate U Give by Angie Thomas

After her friend is shot dead by a police officer, Starr is caught up in the backlash that follows. As protests begin, and her neighbourhood is torn apart by the conflict, Starr has decisions to make about her role in what happens next.



Buffalo Soldier by Tanya Landman

At the end of the American Civil War, Charley - a young African-American slave from the deep south - is ostensibly freed. To survive in a terrifyingly lawless land, where the colour of a person's skin can bring violent death, Charley disguises herself as a man and joins the army.




A House Without Walls by Elizabeth Laird

Safiya and her family have been driven out of Syria by civil war. Safiya knows how lucky she is - lucky not to be living in a refugee camp, lucky to be alive. But it's hard to feel grateful when she's forced to look after her family rather than go back to school, and now that she's lost her home, she's lonelier than ever.



Maus by Art Spiegelman

One of the best and most famous comics of all time, Maus is the story of the author's father, and how he lived and survived Hitler's Europe during the Holocaust.



Code Name Verity by Elizabeth Wein

Only in wartime could a lass from Manchester rub shoulders with a Scottish aristocrat; one a pilot, the other a spy. But when a mission goes wrong, and one of them has to bail out of a faulty plane over France, she is captured by the Gestapo: a prisoner of war.



We Will Not Be Silent by Russell Freedman

The true story of the White Rose Movement, a student group who defected from the Hitler Youth and resisted the Nazis in Germany. Risking imprisonment and execution, the White Rose activists distributed leaflets urging Germans to defy the Nazi government.




The Silver Sword by Ian Serraillier

The silver sword was only a paper knife, but it was a symbol of hope and courage for the Balicki children and their orphan friend Jan while they fended for themselves in war-torn Poland, and on the exhausting and dangerous journey to search for their parents.




The Earth is Singing by Vanessa Curtis

After her father was taken by Russians, Hannah and her Jewish family find themselves in renewed danger when the Nazis occupy Latvia.




An Ember in the Ashes by Sabaa Tahir


Beyond Courage by Doreen Rappaport


All Quiet on the Western Front by E. M. Remarque

In 1914, a room full of German schoolboys, fresh-faced and idealistic, are goaded by their schoolmaster to troop off to the 'glorious war'. With the fire and patriotism of youth, they sign up. What follows is a moving story of life in the trenches.




Salt to the Sea by Ruta Sepetys

When the German ship the Wilhelm Gustloff was sunk in port in early 1945 it had over 9000 civilian refugees, including children, on board. Nearly all were drowned. This novel tells their stories.



Milkweed by Jerry Spinelli

An orphan boy, surviving by stealing food and picking pockets, struggles to survive in the Warsaw ghetto. He wants to be a Nazi, until something happens to change his mind. And when the trains come to empty the Jews from the ghetto of the damned, he realizes it's safest of all to be nobody.




Journey's End by R. C. Sherriff

Now viewed as a classic play, *Journey's End* tells the story of officers in the trenches, and the horrific and comedic incidents they experience. Taking place over four days in the officers' dugout, the play is both tense and touching.




Patron Saints of Nothing by Randy Ribay

A varied and thought-provoking collection of short stories and poems about the meaning of human rights, conflict, and freedom in the world today.




Bone Talk by Candy Gourlay


A Broken World edited by Sebastian Faulks

Orphan Monster Spy by Matt Killeen

And that's to become a monster like them. They think she is just a little girl. But she is the weapon they never saw coming, on a mission to destroy them all.



The Boxer by Nikesh Shukla

Isolated and disconnected in the city he's just moved to, Sunny joins a boxing club. He finds the community he's been desperately seeking at the club, but racial tensions are rising in the city, and when a Far Right march through Bristol turns violent, Sunny is faced with losing his new best friend Keir to radicalisation.



Mohinder's War by Bali Rai

Joelle stumbles across RAF pilot Mohinder when his plane crashes in occupied France and it's up to her family to hide him from the Nazis. Her parents are part of the Resistance and will do all they can to help get Mohinder back to Britain. But when they are betrayed and tragedy strikes, they will have to act fast to evade the enemy.
