




Y7 — Growing Up



The Suitcase Kid by Jacqueline Wilson



Back Home by Michelle Magorian








GROWING UP



Little Women by Louisa May Alcott

A Little Princess by Frances Hodgson Burnett

When wealthy Sara Crewe arrives at boarding school in London, she is determined to make friends, and seems to be succeeding — until tragedy strikes. Sara must fight harder than she thought possible to remain both strong and kind in very difficult circumstances.

Refugee Boy by Benjamin Zephaniah

The Snow Spider by Jenny Nimmo

Children of the New Forest by Frederick Maryatt


